Just a Friendly Reminder: Summer is here and we want to keep our city looking good. Any property with grass and/or weeds growing in excess of ten inches on any lot or property within the Town limits will be deemed a nuisance and is prohibited. Also allowing junk, junked vehicle or vehicle parts to accumulate on a property will be deemed a nuisance and is prohibited.

Whenever any nuisance defined within the Town Ordinances exists within the corporate limits of the Town of Lakeside, any full-time police officer, enforcement officer, building or health inspector employed by the Town shall order the owner and/or occupant where the nuisance exists to abate or remove the nuisance within the time as may be specified by the order, which shall be no less than 24 hours from the time of the notice.

July 4th Pet Safety

Fireworks, picnics and other Fourth of July traditions can be great fun for people: but all of the festivities can be frightening and even dangerous for animals.

- * Don't let pets get near your barbecue grill while it's in use or still hot.
- * Avoid the urge to feed your pets table scraps or other foods intended for people. Keep in mind that foods such as onions, chocolate, alcoholic beverages, coffee, avocado, grapes, raisins, salt and yeast dough can all be potentially toxic to companion animals.
- * Keep sparklers, glow sticks, fireworks, charcoal and kabob skewers away from curious pets.
- * Leave your pets at home when you go to parties, fireworks displays, parades and other gatherings. Loud fireworks, unfamiliar places and crowds can all be very frightening to pets, and there's great risk of pets becoming spooked and running away.
- * If you're hosting guests, ask them to help keep an eye on your pets to make sure they don't escape. Placing notes on exit doors and gates can help both you and your guests remain vigilant.
- * Make sure your pets, cats and dogs alike, have identification tags with up-to-date information. If your pets aren't already microchipped, talk with your veterinarian about microchipping. This simple procedure can greatly improve your chances of getting your pets back if they become lost.
- * Never leave your pet in your car when it's warm outside. Vehicle interiors heat up much faster than the air around them, and even a short time in a locked car can be dangerous to pets.
- * If you're travelling out of town for the holiday, consider leaving your pets at home with a pet sitter or boarding them in a kennel. If you need to bring them with you, be sure you know how to keep them safe.

BARBECUES
 Summertime can be perfect for barbecues and picnics, but don't forget to keep your pet in a secure area if guests will be coming and going. Pets can easily escape in the bustle of a party!

THUNDERSTORMS
 One in five pets goes missing after being scared by loud noises, so be sure to keep your pet in a quiet, secure area at home when summer storms come rolling in.

FIREWORKS
 Loud, crowded fireworks displays are no fun for pets, who can become frightened or disoriented by the sound. Resist the urge to take them to July 4th festivities by keeping them safe at home.

To prevent your pet from going missing, make sure your pet always wears an ID tag with your up-to-date contact info.
